Advent is the beginning of the new church year. There are four Sundays in Advent and it continues until the day before Christmas Eve. Advent is derived from a Latin word for "coming". The season is a time of preparation and expectation for the coming celebration of our Lord's nativity, and for the final coming of Christ "in power and glory." This year Advent begins on November 29.


Advent also marks the beginning of the new church year.

ADVENT WREATHS

There are several different types of Advent Wreaths. However, there is one important part to it; the candles. Each wreath has three blue or purple candles, one pink candle and one white candle.

The first Sunday, light one blue/purple candle. The second Sunday light two blue/purple candles. The third Sunday light the pink candle, for Mary, and two blue/purple candles. The fourth Sunday light all blue/purple candles and the pink candle. Christmas Eve light the white candle, the Christ candle.

We are including prayers for you to use while lighting candles. This might be a new tradition for your family. Perhaps something you incorporate into your Sunday evenings around dinner time.

We also invite your child to practice generosity by doing one small activity a week.

Since we are still unable to sing together
as a community during in-person worship,

GODLY PLAY

Godly Play was created the Rev. Dr.
Jerome W. Berryman. While conducting research in the Texas Medical Center, he realized that there needed to be a simplified method of telling stories to children who were in the hospital. He created Godly Play. Here are some facts taken from the Godly Play Foundation:

- Godly Play is a creative, imaginative approach to Christian formation and spiritual guidance.
- Godly Play has a Montessori foundation with 40+ years of research and practice.
- Godly Play values process, openness, discovery, community and relationships.
- Godly Play models the worship life, stories, symbols and rituals of Christian congregations.
- Godly Play allows practitioners to make relevant and personal theological meaning.
- Godly Play nurtures participants to larger dimensions of belief and faith through wondering and play.

HOW TO MAKE A JESSE TREE

A Jesse tree helps us count down the days to Christmas like an Advent calendar. Allow the children to explore in their yard for a large enough stick to hold the paper ornaments. Secure the stick so it will stand. Print the ornaments. Color and hang with ribbon/string on the branch.



ACTIVTIES

There are readings, discussions and activities that correspond with the ornament. Each Sunday a new week will posted on the website.



JESSE TREE

The Jesse Tree tradition comes from the imagery found in Isaiah 11:1; "A shoot will come from the stump of Jesse; from his roots a branch will bear fruit." Jesse, the father of David, is the great ancestor of Jesus, and the Jesse Tree symbolizes Jesus' family tree. A modern-day Jesse Tree is simply a small tree or branch with a collection of ornaments, each of which symbolize a Bible story from Christ's lineage.
